

Advanced Trauma-Informed Care Training: Implementing Trauma-Informed Care Practices When Working with Opportunity Youth

This advanced trauma-informed practice training will focus on building on direct service providers basic TIC skills by learning how to incorporate trauma-informed skills into their direct practice – specifically this training is designed for agencies and organizations working with opportunity transitional age youth (i.e. ages 16-24). The training will be a combination of dyadic and experiential learning utilizing virtual breakout groups for small group discussions and practice implementation.

By the end of this training participants will be able to:

- Assess utilizing a TIC lens
- Safety plan with a TIC lens
- Identifying Risk with a TIC lens
- Identifying Strengths with a TIC
- Promote healing and collaboration utilizing a TIC lense
